Legal Writing 3

Second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, unless you qualify to take a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class (see below). Legal Writing 3 provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. In the Spring semester, you will take Legal Writing 4, which focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. *Note:* Additional sections of Legal Writing 3 are listed on the Evening Division schedule.

INTERSESSION COURSES

The following Intersession courses are considered Fall courses for purposes of tuition and computing Fall grade point averages. However, the credits will *not* count as part of your Fall course load for purposes of credit hour limitations. ANALYSIS OF SOFTWARE PATENTS IN LIGHT OF RECENT DEVELOPMENTS (2 credits)

Classes will meet from 9:00-12:00 noon and 2:00-5:00 p.m. each day. This course will address recent changes to the laws of obviousness, patentable subject matter, indefiniteness, and divided infringement, and the practical implications of these changes on software patents. The course will touch on KSR Int'l Co. v. Teleflex, Inc. and the subsequent caselaw on obviousness. The course will also focus on the expected Supreme Court decisions in Alice Corporation Pty. Ltd. v. CLS Bank International, Nautilus, Inc. v. Biosig Instruments, Inc., and Limelight Networks, Inc. v. Akamai Technologies, Inc., as well as the caselaw leading up to these decisions. During the course, students will learn practical techniques to analyze existing software patent claims based on these four areas of developing law to form opinions regarding patent validity and patent infringement, and to suggest changes that could eliminate issues that may arise regarding invalidity and non-infringement. There are no prerequisites for the course, although some scientific background could be helpful for understanding patent-related cases.

INTENSIVE TRIAL ADVOCACY 1 (3 credits)

Prerequisite: Evidence. Pass/fail not available. Classes will meet from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. each day, including the intervening Sunday. WHAT EVERY LAWYER SHOULD KNOW ABOUT BUSINESS (1 credit)

This class will provide students with a basic introduction to some of the most important legal and financial subjects that affect businesses, including different types of business entities, securities laws, business ethics, accounting, bankruptcy, tax, and mergers and acquisitions. Different subjects will be taught by different professors who specialize in the area. The goal of the course is to provide students with basic literacy in these topics. We believe this is important, as almost every legal practitioner will encounter these issues and should have some familiarity with them. The course is designed for students who would not otherwise enroll in many business-related courses, as well as for students who would like a birds-eye overview of these subjects before studying them in detail. Classes will meet 10:00 a.m.-12:00 noon and 1:00 p.m. - 3:00 p.m. each day. A multiple-choice exam will be given on Friday, August 22. Faculty includes: Profs. F. Batlan, E. Brody, G. Brown, P. Hablutzal, S. Harris, and A. Walters.
