### **Legal Writing 3**

Second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, unless you qualify to take a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class (see below). Legal Writing 3 provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. In the Spring semester, you will take Legal Writing 4, which focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. Note: Additional sections of Legal Writing 3 are listed on the Evening Division schedule.

If you take a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class this semester, you may take Legal Writing 3 in either Fall or Spring. **Please note**: The Equivalency Class must be taken in the same semester as the activity that qualifies you to take the Equivalency Class - you may not defer the Equivalency Class to a later semester.

### SOFTWARE PATENTS: A PRACTICAL PERSPECTIVE (2 credits)

Prof. Sutton

Classes will meet from 9:00-12:00 noon and 2:00-5:00 p.m. each day. This course does not require a background in software or patent law. *Course description:* In this course, we will discuss the most recent patent laws that have the most significant effects on software innovators, software businesses, and software patent trolls. Students will learn to analyze software-related patents, especially patent claims, to make reasoned judgments with respect to patent infringement and patent validity. This course provides a particular focus on patentable subject matter issues, divided infringement issues, and indefiniteness issues that may arise during this analysis. Students will also learn to make suggestions for improving software patent claims to reduce risks of non-infringement and invalidity while still capturing the core innovation.

### THE LAW OF 9/11 (2 credits)

Prof. Vogel

Classes will meet from 9:00-12:00 noon and 1:00-4:00 p.m. each day. *Course description:* In the fourteen years since September 11, 2001, the law governing national security and armed conflict has received unprecedented levels of attention and experienced significant change. As a result, many students, policy-makers, and practitioners have difficulty making sense of the various sources and applications of this area of the law. In particular, the U.S.-led war against al Qa'ida (formerly styled the "global war on terror") has presented unique and complex questions regarding which laws apply to the conflict, where they apply, when they apply, and to whom they apply. This course will examine the developments and challenges to international law from the 9/11 attacks and subsequent war on terrorism.
