Legislation

Second-year students in the **part-time Day Division** should register for Legislation (see previous page).

Legal Writing 3 and Legal Writing 4

Day Division students are required to take Legal Writing 3 and Legal Writing 4 during their second year. **Legal Writing 3** provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. **Legal Writing 4** focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. All second-year Day Division students were required to take Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, except for those who took a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class (e.g., certain Law Review students). Students who took an Equivalency Class in the Fall, and deferred Legal Writing 3, must register for Legal Writing 3 in the Spring semester. All other second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 4 in the Spring semester.

INTERSESSION COURSES

The following Intersession courses are considered Spring courses for purposes of tuition and computing Spring grade point averages. However, the credits will not count as part of your Spring course load for purposes of credit hour limitations. If registering for an intersession course will put you over your maximum credit limit, please contact Dean Sowle so that your maximum credit limit can be adjusted in the registration system.

ADR IN THE WORKPLACE (2 credits) - Prof. Malin

Pass/fail not available. This intensive class explores the doctrine and process of labor arbitration and employment mediation and arbitration. Students will participate in selecting neutral arbitrators, prepping for and conducting labor arbitrations and an employment mediation and arbitration. There will be comments, critiques and suggestions at every step along the way. The condensed schedule should help you focus on mediation and arbitration as you would in real life. Class will meet in person for approximately 21 hours during the week (the hours will vary depending on the day, and there will be no in-person class session on Wednesday), with approximately 5 hours of additional instruction through distance learning techniques. If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it no later than Monday, December 22, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. Priority for this class will be given to students seeking the Labor and Employment Law Certificate.

INTENSIVE TRIAL ADVOCACY 1 (3 credits) - Prof. Erickson and faculty

Prerequisite: Evidence. Pass/fail not available. Classes will meet from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. each day, including the intervening Sunday. If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it by Friday, December 12, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. **Note: You must take Trial Advocacy 2 in the Spring semester if you take Intensive Trial Advocacy.**

INTENSIVE I.P. TRIAL ADVOCACY (3 credits) - Prof. Parkhurst and faculty

Prerequisites: Evidence and two of the following: Patent Law, Trademarks & Unfair Competition, Copyright Law, Law of Trade Secrets, Patent Litigation. Pass/fail not available. Students who have taken Trial Advocacy 1 (including the intensive version of the class) are *not* eligible to take this course. Classes will meet from 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. each day, including the intervening Sunday. Priority will be given to students enrolled in the Intellectual Property certificate program.

Course number: 540-01

MADRID SYSTEM FOR INTERNATIONAL REGISTRATION OF MARKS (1 credit) - Prof. Municoy

There is no prerequisite for this class. The class will analyze what is currently known as the Madrid System for the international registration of marks (the Madrid Agreement Concerning the International Registration of Marks of 1891 and the Protocol Relating to the Madrid Agreement adopted in 1989). The procedures to achieve the registration and maintenance of a mark in the International Register administered by WIPO will be reviewed in detail as well as the relationship of the Madrid System with other international IP agreements. Additionally, the factors to be considered when assessing the pros and cons of using the Madrid System instead of the alternatives (national or regional registration systems) will also be covered. Classes will meet from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon each day. There will be a take-home exam early in the Spring semester.

Monday, January 12 - Friday, January 16

Course number: 287-01

STRATEGIC PROBLEM-SOLVING AND THE LAW (3 credits) - Profs. Johnson and Baker

Pass/fail only. This course will immerse students in complex, contemporary legal problems that demand creative, sophisticated analysis and prompt action. Working entirely in groups, students will delve into different subject areas, including employment relationships, environmental law, human rights and relational contracts. Each of the four problems that we work on will include intensive, practical research training; in particular, the course will be covering free, practice-related research, government document research, international law and business research. The course aims to simulate decision-making challenges that you often don't face in law school, but frequently face in the real world. Students will produce several kinds of written work product, including client letters, informal inter-agency memos, corporate policy papers, and negotiation outlines. Students will also give oral group presentations to a "client," a "commissioner," and an "executive board." You will be expected to be available at school from 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. each day except Friday (when we will end by 4 p.m.), and there will be additional work to be done at home in the evening and over the weekend prior to the beginning of class. If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it no later than Wednesday, January 7, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. Priority for this class will be given to students seeking the Praxis Certificate.
