Legal Writing 3

Second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, unless you qualify to take a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class (see below). Legal Writing 3 provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. In the Spring semester, you will take Legal Writing 4, which focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. Note: Additional sections of Legal Writing 3 are listed on the Evening Division schedule.

SOFTWARE PATENTS: A PRACTICAL PERSPECTIVE (2 credits)

This course provides a particular focus on patentable subject matter issues, divided infringement issues, and indefiniteness issues that may arise during this analysis. Students will also learn to make suggestions for improving software patent claims to reduce risks of non-infringement and invalidity while still capturing the core innovation.
