Legal Writing 3

Second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, unless you qualify to take a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class (see below). Legal Writing 3 provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. In the Spring semester, you will take Legal Writing 4, which focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. **Note:** Additional sections of Legal Writing 3 are listed on the Evening Division schedule.

Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Classes

Prerequisite: Evidence. Pass/fail not available. Classes will meet from 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. each day, including the intervening Sunday. If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it by Friday, July 27, or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. Students who have taken Evidence and the Art of Advocacy may not take this class. **Note: You must take Trial Advocacy 2 in the Fall semester if you take Intensive Trial Advocacy.**

INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY IN THE HIGH TECH ERA (4 credits) - Profs. Piatt and Alexis

Course number: 283-01

Monday, August 12 - Friday, August 23

Pass/fail not available. This course is a survey of intellectual property law (patent, copyright, trademark, trade secret) in the context of the innovation design process. It is co-taught by Prof. Piatt from the law school and Prof. Alexis from the institute of design at IIT. After absorbing the primary aspects of the legal regimes, hands-on design exercises are performed and evaluated in light of the protections available at the various innovation design stages and the various innovative "by-products" that are developed along the way to a innovative solution to an actual problem. The course will meet every day, except for Sunday, August 18. Meeting times will vary depending on the day. There will be a group project in lieu of a final exam. The syllabus and assignments will be provided to students in early July. **Please note:** This course is intended for law students who are not pursuing the Intellectual Property certificate; we do not expect or advise certificate students to take the course. However, certificate students are not prohibited from taking the course. Students who take the course and later decide to pursue the I.P. certificate may take any I.P. course in the future. This course will not, however, count towards the credits needed to earn the certificate.
