Legal Writing 3 & Legal Writing 4

Day Division students are required to take Legal Writing 3 and Legal Writing 4 during their second year. **Legal Writing 3** provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. **Legal Writing 4** focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. All second-year Day Division students were required to take Legal Writing 3 in the Fall semester, except for those who took a Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Class (e.g., certain Law Review students). Students who took an Equivalency Class in the Fall, and deferred Legal Writing 3, must register for Legal Writing 3 in the Spring semester. All other second-year Day Division students must register for Legal Writing 4 in the Spring semester.

MADRID AND HAGUE SYSTEMS FOR INTERNATIONAL REGISTRATIONS OF MARKS AND DESIGNS (1 credit)

Prof. Municoy

There is no prerequisite for this class. The class will analyze what is currently known as the Madrid System for the international registration of marks (composed by the Madrid Agreement of 1891 and the Protocol adopted in 1989) as well as the Hague Agreement for the international registration of designs (composed by three different and independent Acts). The procedures to achieve the registration and maintenance of mark and designs in the International Registers administered by WIPO will be reviewed in detail as well as the relationship of both international Systems with other international IP agreements. Additionally, the factors to be considered when assessing the pros and cons of using the international route (Madrid/Hague System) instead of the alternatives (national or regional registration systems) will be covered. The class will include instruction on how to file an application for trademark registration or design patent as well as a general review of the most important recent cases, including those involving Apple and Samsung. Classes will meet from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon each day. There will be a take-home exam early in the Spring semester.

STRATEGIC PROBLEM-SOLVING AND THE LAW (2 or 3 credits)

Profs. Baker and Johnson

Pass/fail only. This course will immerse students in complex, contemporary legal problems that demand creative, sophisticated analysis and prompt action. Working entirely in groups, students will delve into different subject areas, including employment relationships, environmental law, consumer rights and relational contracts. Each of the four problems that we work on will include intensive, practical research training; in particular, the course will be covering free, practice-related research, government document research, international law and business research. The course aims to simulate decision-making challenges that you often don't face in law school, but frequently face in the real world. Students will produce several kinds of written work product, including client letters, informal inter-agency memos, corporate policy papers, and negotiation outlines. Students will also give oral group presentations to a "client," a "Governor's chief of staff," and an "executive board." You will be expected to be available at school from 8:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. each day except Friday (when we will end by 4:00 p.m.). There will be preliminary reading and research, emailed to you in December, but which must be done before class starts. You may take the course for 2 or 3 credits; students taking it for 3 credits will be assigned some supplemental reading and be required to complete a short paper, which will be due the last day of Spring Break. If you enroll in the course and later decide not to take it, you must drop it no later than **Wednesday, January 8, at 3:00 p.m.** or you will be charged full tuition for the course unless another student takes your seat. Priority for this class will be given to students seeking the Praxis Certificate. First-year students may not take this class.
