Legal Writing 3 provides an introduction to researching and writing about non-litigation transactional issues and documents, with additional emphasis on oral communication with colleagues and clients. All sections of Legal Writing 3 are offered as General Practice sections. In the Spring semester, you will take Legal Writing 4, which focuses on advanced research and writing skills in a variety of doctrinal areas and on creating legal instruments common to these areas. **Note:** Additional sections of Legal Writing 3 are listed on the Evening Division schedule.

### Legal Writing 4 Equivalency Classes
